Highlights of the 83rd Annual Meeting of the SPA

A dues increase will be implemented in 2013.

The Elmer Erb Fund made money last year and made up the losses incurred in 2008. The Fund is solvent.

The 2013 meeting will be held in Uniontown, PA on April 19-21 hosted by Mon-Yough Chapter.

PAC NEWSPAC sponsored Archaeology Day at the Capitol. Future Archaeology Day events will be held on the last Wednesday of October. The Fisher award was given to Charles Jacob, chairperson of the board of supervisors for Warwick Township in Chester County. PAC is looking for future recipients from the western part of the state, which has been under-represented in recent years. The Fisher Award which recognizes public officials for their help in conservation of historic and archaeological resources.

The Pennsylvania Archaeologist Editor Bill Tippins suggested a theme issue dealing with archaeology of the Civil War or other conflicts. If anyone has research or papers on Civil War related topics, please contact the editor.

<u>Site Survey/PASS forms</u>—Noel Strattan reported that there are now 22,160 sites recorded in Pennsylvania. The county with the most new sites recorded was Washington County with 78 new sites. Remember to include chapter affiliations when recording sites.

<u>Collections and Curation Committee</u>—Janet Johnson is working with Noel Strattan on the weekly blog which is spotlighting counties. She welcomes comment and participation by the archaeological community statewide. A small brochure or rack card will be produced to outline the procedure for donating collections to the museum.

Chapter reports were received from all but two of the active chapters of the SPA.

<u>Education Committee</u>—Catherine Spohn summarized the work of the education committee. The committee is currently planning another event at Cabela's and looking for a venue in the western part of the state. Rack cards have been printed and are available

for promotional use, a speakers list is being compiled and educational materials are being developed to accompany the 2012 poster and calendar for Archaeology Month.

2012 ANNUAL WORKSHOPS IN ARCHAEOLOGY PROGRAM

Saturday, November 3, 2012 The State Museum of Pennsylvania 300 North Street Harrisburg, Pennsylvania

Cosponsored By: Society for Pennsylvania Archaeology, Pennsylvania Archaeological Council, and The Archaeology Section of The State Museum of Pennsylvania invites you to attend the annual Workshops in Archaeology on Saturday, November 3, 2012. Designed for the public, this year's program features presentations focused on European colonization from the Contact Period, 1550 AD, through the end of the Revolutionary War in 1783. This early period of the Commonwealth's history was marked by dramatic cultural changes among the native peoples of Penn's Woods resulting from con-tact with European traders and colonists. Presentations will focus on the archaeological evidence of this changing frontier and the impact of trade and warfare on settlement and colonization. Additional programming includes a flint knapping demonstration, French & Indian War re-enactors, and an artifact identification session. The Bureau for Historic Preservation will provide information and assistance in recording archaeological sites which is essential for protecting and preserving our archaeological heritage. Closing comments from Steve Warfel will summarize the workshop sessions and reflect on this significant period in Pennsylvania history. The workshops will be followed by a reception in the Anthropology and Archaeology Gallery of The State Museum where the audience may interact with presenters.

Contact, Conflict and Colonization: The Archaeology of Penn's Woods

Session Descriptions

9:10 a.m.-9:50 a.m. [Session I] Proto-Contact Monongahela Culture

James Herbstritt, The State Museum of Pennsylvania

The focus of this presentation is the Proto-Contact Monongahela trade of southwestern Pennsylvania, West Virginia Panhandle and western Maryland between 1575-1615/30. Monongahela settlements, routes of trade and trade objects of the earliest period are highlighted. **9:50 a.m.-10:30 a.m.**

Session 2] The Lemoyne Site: A Susquehannock Village in Cumberland County, PA Andrew Wyatt, M.A.

This presentation will feature findings from recent archaeological investigations sponsored by Norfolk Southern Rail-way and the Borough of Lemoyne which produced evidence of a Native American Susquehannock village site dating between 1610 and 1625 A.D. The discovery of this site has provided archaeologists with a clearer understanding of Susquehannock settlement patterns in the lower Susquehanna Valley. Additionally, the systematic recovery of botanical remains through floatation has supplied valuable information in forming a more comprehensive picture of Susquehannock agricultural practices.

[Session 3] Archaeology of the Lenape: Greg Lattanzi, Assistant Curator, Bureau of Archaeology & Ethnography, N J State Museum

Archaeology conducted on sites located in the Delaware River Valley has provided archaeologists with a better understanding of the prehistory of this region and the culture groups who lived here. Lenape Indians who occupied this region when Dutch, English and Swedish traders began to arrive in Pennsylvania experienced the earliest European colonization in Pennsylvania. Examination of the archaeological evidence of this cultural exchange will be presented and discussed.

[Session 4] Susquehannock Use of Copper-Based Metals during the Early and Middle Contact Periods Lisa Marie Anselmi, Ph.D., SUNY Buffalo State

This presentation explores the use of European-introduced copper-based metals by the Susquehannocks during the late 16th and early 17th centuries. The manufacturing techniques used and the forms crafted by the Susquehannock are out-lined and possible interactions among the Susquehannock and other Northern Iroquoian nations are suggested.

9:00-12:00 p.m. - Auditorium Foyer Flint Knapping Demonstration, Steve Nissly

This presentation will feature a highly experienced flint knapper who will demonstrate how stone tools were made during the Prehistoric and Contact periods in Pennsylvania.

18th Century Reenactors Phil Craver and William Laubscher

These experienced presenters portray Native Americans who participated in the turbulent period of the French & Indian War and the American Revolution.

1:10 p.m. -3:30 p.m. - Curiosity Connection Artifact Identification by Doug McLearen, Chief, Archaeology & Protection and Kira Heinrich, Bureau for Historic Preservation

These two individuals have over 50 years of experience with identifying archaeological artifacts. Bring in your historic or prehistoric artifacts for analysis by the experts.

1:10 p.m.-1:50 p.m.

[Session 5] Madame Montour's Otstonwakin: Colonial Encounters on the Eve of the French & Indian War Dr. Mary Ann Levine, Franklin & Marshall College

This presentation focuses on early 18th century colonial encounters just prior to the French & Indian War through the use of both enthnohistoric documents and the archaeological evidence recovered from excavations conducted at Otstonwakin near present day Montoursville, Pennsylvania. Madame Montour, a woman of Native and European de-scent, served as a translator to colonial governments, worked as a frontier diplomat, and provided leadership to this multinational Native American village.

I:50 p.m. - 2:30 p.m. [Session 6] Between Two Empires: Archaeology at Fort Shirley and Aughwick Dr. Jonathan A. Burns, Juniata College & Penn State University

Recent excavations at Fort Shirley (36HU94), in Huntingdon County, have revealed details of frontier life during the beginning of the French & Indian War in North America. Built by George Croghan in 1755, the palisade enclosure is a rare example of a provincial fort exhibiting a distinct Native American presence, a testament to the special relationship between Croghan and the Ohio Seneca. Over the past three summers of excavations, the Penn State University Archaeology field school has located the fort's palisade walls and a plethora of artifacts informative of culture contact and defense on the Pennsylvania frontier. Additionally during the 2012 season, survey testing has located Aughwick Old Town (1754-1756)—the refugee village occupied by the influential Seneca (or Mingo) that sided with the British during both Washington's and Braddock's expeditions to the Ohio Country.

2:30 p.m. – 3:10 p.m.

[Session 7] In Search of the Fort at Fort Hunter, Janet R. Johnson, Curator, The State Museum of Pennsylvania

Archaeology conducted at Fort Hunter Mansion and Park (36Da159) over the past six years by The State Museum of Pennsylvania has yielded hundreds of fort period (1756-1763) artifacts and several features. Artifacts and features indicate the presence of the fort, but a stockade line has not been discovered. Fort Hunter served as a supply fort along the western frontier and was one of three forts in a line of defense along the Susquehanna River erected during the early stages of the French & Indian War. These excavations also serve as public outreach for visitors who have been able to see archaeologists at work and better appreciate the contributions of archaeology to our heritage.

3:30 p.m. - 4:10 p.m.

[Session 8] The Preservation of Camp Security, A Revolutionary War Prison Camp, Mark Shaffer, BHP

This presentation summarizes the history of Camp Security, a prisoner-of-war camp for British captives. Archaeological investigations conducted in 1979 and 2000 are discussed, as is the work of the Friends of Camp Security, an organization founded by local historic preservation advocates, which has been instrumental in the preservation of this unique site.




