President's Message

The Past is Important in Bad Times Too

It is more than ironic that the PHMC's 2008 theme would revolve around the Great Depression: "75th Anniversary – The New Deal". By this summer, with the extent of the economy's deterioration becoming apparent, emergency measures were being implemented to cut spending for the remainder of the year – including the prospect of canceling the archaeology exhibit at the 2009 Farm Show. More than 400,000 people visit the Farm Show each year, and a rough estimate indicated that perhaps 50,000 visitors had stopped by the PHMC archaeology exhibit last year. The cuts also called for the halt of reprinting the popular series of archaeology-themed brochures the PHMC has been producing in recent years (the PHMC given out all 10,000 "Petroglyphs of Pennsylvania" it had produced last year). The SPA, PAC, and PHMC staff all realized the need for this kind of public outreach, and in October agreements were reached with the SPA and PAC to help fund the exhibit and reprints, and with the Farm Show to donate the exhibit space. SPA and PAC will benefit by having increased presence and exposure at the exhibit, and it is thanks to you that the SPA had the financial resources to help in this effort.

This demonstrates the predicament of hard economic times and also presents us with an opportunity to pursue one of the major purposes of our organization – public education. When budgets are squeezed, perhaps "savings bits of the past" doesn't seem to be as much of a priority as in more prosperous times. It is during times like these that we need to step up to remind the public that when the past is lost, it's lost forever. I ask that in the coming year we redouble our efforts to reach out to the public to educate them about the importance of archaeology -- it's place in helping us preserve, learn about, and understand our past. Knowing about our past gives us an anchor, a sense of place, an identity. It gives us insight and understanding of other cycles of good times and bad. And it gives us hope and courage to face the future and prevail as the countless generations who have come before us have done.

National Park Service's 2009 Archaeological Prospection Workshop

The National Park Service's 2009 workshop on archaeological prospection techniques entitled Current Archaeological Prospection Advances for Non-Destructive Investigations in the 21st Century will be held May 18-22, 2009, at the National Park Service's National Center for Preservation Technology and Training, Natchitoches, Louisiana. Lodging will be at the Ramada Inn. The field exercises will take place at the Los Adaes State Historic Site (a Spanish presidio and capital of the Spanish province of Texas between 1719 and 1772). Co-sponsors for the workshop include the National Park Service, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Los Adaes State Historic Site, Northwestern State University of Louisiana, and the Louisiana Division of Archaeology. This will be the nineteenth year of the workshop dedicated to the use of geophysical, aerial photography, and other remote sensing methods as they apply to the identification, evaluation, conservation, and protection of archaeological resources across this Nation. The workshop will present lectures on the theory of operation, methodology, processing, and interpretation with on-hands use of the equipment in the field. There is a registration charge of \$475.00. Call for Nominations for the Annual SPA Awards

Deadline for submitting: FEB. 27, 2009

Any individual SPA member, or SPA Chapter as a whole, may submit nominations in writing to the Awards Chairman of an <u>SPA MEMBER</u>, of any chapter, or an SPA member who is unaffiliated with any chapter, who is deemed worthy of an SPA award in the categories listed below:

ARCHEY Award: Nominee must be a member of SPA, not just a chapter. This award is presented to a non-professional who has given significant contributions, over an appreciable period of time, toward the unselfish furtherance of archaeology. The number of separate nominations and the significance of the reasons for the nomination are weighed in making the selection for this award.

The individual's contributions toward archaeology may be offices held; numbers and kinds of speaking engagements; published articles or reports; number and kinds of sites recorded and/or excavated; work with young people to acquaint them with archaeology, etc.

J. ALDEN MASON Award: This award is presented to an SPA member who is a professional archaeologist and is based on his or her contribution to education and encouragement of SPA members in the proper pursuit of archaeology.

A professional in a related science, which similarly assists SPA members, may also be considered for this award. The nominee need not reside in Pennsylvania.

JOHN WITTHOFT Award: This award is presented to the chapter of the SPA that recruited the most new SPA members or reinstated the highest number of delinquent SPA members since the previous SPA Annual Meeting.

SHRADER/GEORGE Award: Nominee must be an SPA member under 18 years of age and be an example of the SPA's ideal youth, whose character, accomplishments, and unselfish effort have furthered the cause of Pennsylvania archaeology. Sites upon which the nominee has participated should be recorded and have a designated State site number and the nominee should have experience in recording such sites and properly cataloging artifacts from the sites.

Please provide adequate background and information on nominees as inadequate information or failure to meet the award criteria could result in disqualification.

FRANCES DORRANCE AWARD: This is an award that will be given to the Chapter of the SPA that has recorded the most new sites with the Pennsylvania Archaeology Site Survey at the State Museum, Harrisburg, PA, FOR THE CALENDAR YEAR OF 2008. Note: Members recording sites should fill in the Chapter area on the PASS site reporting form. Noel Strattan will tally the sites from these reports.

LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD:

Person nominated should have at least 25 years of outstanding service to archaeology in Pennsylvania; been a member of SPA for the same amount of time and be an exemplary proponent of the purpose and objectives of SPA. Nominations can be made by a Chapter or an individual member in good standing of SPA. Nominees can be either a professional archaeologist (or a professional in a closely related science), or an avocational archaeologist with an outstanding record of contributions to the field of archaeology and to SPA. In 1974, James L. Swauger published the landmark book *Rock Art of the Upper Ohio*, which still stands today as the most comprehensive study of Native American petroglyphs in this area. Since the book had a limited print run and was produced in Austria, it was difficult to obtain in the United States, even when it first appeared. I therefore considered it a rare opportunity when I purchased a copy in mint condition at a recent Society for Pennsylvania Archaeology meeting. I then launched an effort to digitize this copy so that future researchers would be able to access Swauger's work more easily. Although the enclosed CD doesn't match the grandeur of the original 10 3/4" x 14 1/4" hardcover version (printed in black and white), the information and images are captured for your benefit. All proceeds from the sale of this CD benefit the Society for Pennsylvania Archaeology.



Chapter Profile: Frances Dorrance #11

The Frances Dorrance Chapter No. 11 had its beginnings in Wilkes-Barre, Pa. in 1958. The Chapter was named for Frances Dorrance, director of the Wyoming Historical and Geological Society. Miss Dorrance was instrumental in helping to establish the Society for Pennsylvania Archaeology.

The Chapter has continuously operated for fifty years. Its first excavation was at the Schacht Site (36-Lu-1), a Late Woodland fortified village in the Dundee section of Nanticoke, southwest of Wilkes-Barre. Since that time, numerous sites have been excavated by members of the Chapter under the direction of professional archaeologists.

The Conrail Site (36-Lu-169) is continuing on this vital research. We are working on Block 17 EXT. which has produced artifacts from the Middle Woodland to Early Archaic Periods and are constantly up-dating our statistics since the early 1990's in the preparation of an article regarding the Conrail Site. While shovel testing in area near Block 17, we have found a foundation dating to 1840's and earlier. Much more work is needed. We are planning to excavate the entire foundation area. This will be part of our chapter activity in 2009. This firmly places the site in an important early historic/prehistoric reference to its location at the juncture of the Lackawanna River and the Susquehanna River respectively.

In Memoriam



MacCORD, Howard Arthur Sr., 93, of Brandermill Woods Retirement Community, Midlothian, died November 3, 2008, after a brief hospitalization. He was born in Irvington, New Jersey on October 23, 1915. Mr. MacCord retired from the U.S. Army as a Colonel, after 30 years of service. He joined the National Guard in 1930, when he was only 15, and went into the Army in February of 1941. His World War II service took him to France and Germany. He served in post-war Japan and later in the Korean conflict. His lifelong interest in archeology started in the 1930s, helping excavate prehistoric sites around his boyhood hometown of Washington, D.C. While in the Army, he excavated in Japan and Korea during his tours of duty. Following his retirement from the military in 1962, he turned his lifelong avocation into a new career as an archeologist with the Virginia State Library (now the Library of Virginia), from which he retired in 1976. He worked as a consulting archeologist until 1983. He worked closely with the Archeological Society of Virginia during all those years, reaching out to educate the public. His interest in archeology did not abate with retirement; he continued his work and contributed to the advancement of that field until his death. His contributions to Virginia archeology were extensive. They include excavations, or testing, at over 160 sites all over Virginia. His published works include over 127 articles, including his first publication in 1943 and his most recent in 2007. A memorial service was held November 22, 2008 at Brandermill Church, Midlothian.
