President's Column

As April rapidly approaches, I want to encourage everyone to attend the annual meeting scheduled for April 7-9 in Harrisburg. Jim Herbstritt has informed me that there is a full program, including Sunday morning presentations. I realize that not everyone can or is willing to attend a meeting rather distant from their home. However, the annual meeting offers a venue for sharing research, reestablishing old connections, catching up on news, and just enjoying the moment. Attendance also allows our membership (or you) to attend the Saturday morning business meeting and express your likes and dislikes. No one really wants to hear the latter, but unless everyone is comfortable with the way-things-are, dislikes are important because these can lead to substantive changes of a positive nature for our organization.

In 2018, the new journal will make its appearance. The size will be changing to 8 1/2 by 11 and there will be color. Submissions can take one of several forms: longer articles (exceeding 5 pages), summary reports (3-5 pages), and artifact pictures and associated text (1-2 pages). At present time, the journal is behind because of our unwillingness to send manuscripts to the editor. Not everyone wants to write a several page manuscript. To offset this, the summary report will allow individuals to send material to the editor that will not be peer-reviewed other than by the editor. I am hoping that by developing a number of submission types, and omitting peer-review for some items, the editor will be able to maintain two issues per year. We can also continue having book reviews, but I think these should only focus upon publications written about Pennsylvania Archaeology.

I would also like to see more information about the chapter activities in the newsletter, as well as listed on our website. I would encourage our student members to send information to the secretary relevant to Pennsylvania Archaeology. Such information could take the form of an honor thesis (title and abstract), M. A. thesis (title and abstract), or dissertation (title and abstract). Students are encouraged to send a digital copy of their research to the webpage editor for inclusion in the member's only section.

I am sorry that I was not able to visit all of the chapters in the eastern portion of the commonwealth. However, I do still intend to visit those chapters. My new title will be president-elect for the Eastern States Archaeology Federation. I will work on this over the next 15 months, with the goal of visiting the remaining chapters by the annual meeting in 2018. I will begin making my schedule plans at the annual meeting in April by talking with chapter presidents.

Membership is still an important concern for the board and for me. It is imperative that we continue to grow our organization and attract younger members. As many of us consider the possibility of retiring the trowel, chapters need young blood to continue our work. We cannot afford to be considered an organization of seniors.

Finally, April also brings to a close my leadership as the President of our organization. It has been an honor to serve you in this capacity. Initiatives that I have started and helped start include the student spotlight, the new fall workshop held in the western part of the state, and the summer field trip which is a collaboration with past president Dr. Sarah Neusius. Details of the next field trip can be found in this issue of the newsletter. Sign-up early to guarantee a seat because space for this trip is limited.

SPA 2017 MEMBERS' FIELD TRIP : MUSEUMS OF NEW YORK STATE

This year we will be visiting a number of museums and learning about the archaeology conducted in New York. Join us as we visit the State Museum in Albany, the Iroquois Indian Museum at Howes Cave, The Ganondagan State Historic Site and Museum, and the Rochester Museum and Science Center. The trip starts on the evening of Thursday, June 8 in Binghamton, New York and continues through Sunday, June 11. Pennsylvania Farms Show 2017 Our theme for this year's exhibit at the Pennsylvania Farm Show was *Pennsylvania Petroglyphs – a rare glimpse into the minds of ancient Native Americans*. The exhibit which ran daily from January 7-14, 9 a.m. - 9 p.m., represents a major investment of staff and volunteers, but there is no question that our presentation makes a difference in Pennsylvania archaeology. The dugout canoe continues to draw people to sit and imagine paddling on the rivers and lakes of Pennsylvania as an Indian hundreds of years ago. They were awestruck by the digitized banner which illustrates the Little Indian Rock petroglyphs or rubbing their hands over the resin cast of the Parkers Landing Water Panther petroglyph.

This is a great opportunity for Chapters to attend and promote both their local chapter and the state organization. This year we offered a “make your own petroglyph” station for children to trace designs representative of petroglyphs across the state into their story. This was popular with many children and provided another opportunity to interact with their parents. We spoke to over 30,000 visitors and distributed over 13,500 archaeology brochures and over 3600 temporary tattoos, free planetarium passes and magazines, including 750 copies of American Archaeology magazine, 1100 Archaeology Month posters and 670 back issues of Pennsylvania Heritage Magazine. These

were especially important in promoting the Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission, the State Museum, and the Heritage Foundation.

W. Fred Kinsey Scholarship

Students currently pursuing an undergraduate or graduate degree are eligible to apply for the W. Fred Kinsey Meeting Scholarship. Eligibility is dependent on a complete, single-author paper with PowerPoint slides (if appropriate) to be presented at the annual meeting of The Society for Pennsylvania Archaeology. Student presentations must be accepted by the program chair for the SPA annual meeting to qualify. Papers should focus on topics relevant to Pennsylvania archaeology. Award of the Scholarship requires submission of the complete paper by a single author, in an electronic format (Word or WordPerfect) to the Program Chair by the regular submission deadline date for papers as set by the Program Chair. The Program Chair Person this year is Jim Herbstritt, submission deadline for abstracts is **March 17, 2017**. Selection of the winning paper is decided by committee review and will be based on quality of original research, presentation and appeal to the avocational and professional archaeology community. The committee consists of at least three members of the Society, one from staff of the PHMC and one member from the education committee of the Society. The W. Fred Kinsey Scholarship was created in 2009 to encourage students to participate at the annual meetings of the Society by presenting scholarly research in a friendly, professional atmosphere. Dr. Kinsey was a curator with the former William Penn Memorial Museum, now The State Museum, before going to Franklin and Marshall College and The North Museum from the early 60's thru the mid 1980's. He made significant contributions to the archaeological record and mentored many students who went on to become noteworthy archaeologists on their own merits.

Presentation of the award will be announced at the **Annual Meeting of the Society for Pennsylvania Archaeology on April 7-9, 2017 in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania**. The selected paper will be published on-line through the PHMC website and submitted for review to the editor of the journal *Pennsylvania Archaeologist* for possible publication. The editor of the journal will make the final decision on publication. Donations are encouraged to support the W. Fred Kinsey Scholarship fund. In addition to the monetary award and publication assistance, one year of membership in the Society is included in the award. National Park Service's 2017 Archaeological Prospection Workshop

The National Park Service's 2017 workshop on archaeological prospection techniques entitled *Current Archeological Prospection Advances for Non-destructive Investigations of the Pea Ridge Civil War Battlefield* will be held May 15--19, 2017, at the Pea Ridge National Military Park in Benton County, Arkansas. Lodging will be in Roger, Arkansas, at a motel to be determined. The lectures will be at a meeting room in Rogers, Arkansas, at a place to be determined. The field exercises will take place at the Pea Ridge National Military Park. The park commemorates the March 7-8, 1862 Civil War battle between Federal and Confederate troops in northwestern Arkansas. The resulting Federal victory keep the State of Missouri in the Union. Co-sponsors for the workshop include the National Park Service's Midwest Archeological Center, Pea Ridge National Military Park, and the National Center for Preservation Technology and Training, as well as the Arkansas Archaeological Survey. This will be the twenty-seventh year of the workshop dedicated to the use of geophysical, aerial photography, and other remote sensing methods as they apply to the identification, evaluation, conservation, and protection of archaeological resources across this Nation. The workshop will present lectures on the theory of operation, methodology, processing, and interpretation with on-hands use of the equipment in the field. There is a registration charge of \$475.00. Harlan B. "Ben" Freyermuth, 99, of Bethlehem Township passed away Saturday, February 11, 2017. His wife, the late Doris A. (Dean) Freyermuth, passed away February 1, 2016. Ben retired as a research chemist from General Aniline and Film. After retirement, he was a consultant for Baker Chemical. He was issued over 80 patents. He graduated from the University of Iowa where he received his Ph.D. in organic chemistry.

An amateur archaeologist, Ben enjoyed looking for Indian artifacts and arrowheads. He and his late wife were founding members of Chapter 14 of the Society of Pennsylvania Archeology. He was instrumental in excavating an American Indian burial site in Kintnersville. He received the Archey Award from the State of Pennsylvania for his contributions to the science of archaeology in 1993.

Ben and Doris worked on Ovberpeck in Pennsylvania and the Snyder Site in New Jersey among many sites. Their collection were donated to appropriate repositories in the respective states. They influenced a number of current archaeologists and worked with many at the beginning stages of their careers. They were get promoter of Chapter 14 and the SPA. 

New in Print



Decorated stone artifacts are a significant part of archaeological studies of Native Americans in the Northeast. The artifacts illuminated in *Amulets, Effigies, Fetishes, and Charms: Native American Artifacts and Spirit Stones from the Northeast* include pecked, sculpted, or incised figures, images, or symbols. These are rendered on pebbles, plaques, pendants, axes, pestles, and atlatl weights, and are of varying sizes, shapes, and designs. Edward J. Lenik draws from Indian myths and legends and incorporates data from ethnohistoric and archaeological sources together with local environmental settings to interpret the iconography of these fascinating relics. For the Algonquian and Iroquois peoples, they reflect identity, status, and social relationships with other Indians as well as beings in the spirit world.

The material in this book, used in conjunction with Lenik's previous research, offers a reference for virtually every known example of northeastern rock art. Archaeologists, students, and connoisseurs of Indian artistic expression will find this an invaluable work.

Edward J. Lenik is the president and principal investigator of Sheffield Archaeological Consultants, a cultural resource management firm in Wayne, New Jersey. An authority on rock art in the Northeast, he has led workshops on artifact analysis and archaeology lab work at New Jersey museums. He is the author of *Making Pictures in Stone: American Indian Rock Art of the Northeast* and *Picture Rocks: American Indian Rock Art in the Northeast Woodlands*.
